HEREFORD ASSIZES WHERE ARE THEY???

The county assizes are held here, likewise the petty sessions for the hundred of Grimsworth every Saturday ; and, under certain restrictions, those of Oyer and Terminer for the whole of South Wales. The old town and shire-hall, erected in the reign of James I., is a large edifice of timber and brick, supported on twenty- seven pillars of solid oak : it formerly contained an upper story, in which were chambers for the fourteen differ ent trading companies of the city, but has been much reduced in height and beauty, and, though formerly ap propriated, by consent of the corporation, as proprietors of it, to the courts of assize, session, and public meetings for the county, was surrendered to that body in 1817.

The new shire-hall was erected by act of parliament passed in the 55th of George III., authorising a sum not exceeding £30,000 to be raised, for the purpose of build ing courts of justice, county hall, &c., together with a depot for arms and military clothing, including the pur chase of an appropriate site ; also a further sum of £3150, to purchase a house for the accommodation of the judges. This edifice has been completed from a de sign by Mr. Smirke : the portico in front is a fine spe cimen of Grecian Doric architecture, copied from the Temple of Theseus at Athens : a subterraneous passage, through which prisoners are brought to the bar, leads to the Crown court, from an apartment beneath the grand jury room, in which they are kept during the trials : the hall is decorated with portraits of George III. and the late Duke of Norfolk, and here the quarter sessions, county meetings, and the triennial musical festivals, are held.

The city gaol is an ancient building, the original part containing seven cells for felons, and three sleepingrooms for debtors ; to which an addition has recently been made, comprising four cells for males, and three for females, with spacious airing-yards. The county gaol was erected in 1798, upon Mr. Howard's plan, and occupies the site of St. Guthlac's priory, at the foot of Aylestone hill, being enclosed by a brick wall : the en trance, over which is the place of execution, is orna mented with Tuscan pillars : the prison contains appro priate apartments for the classification of prisoners of both sexes, with day-rooms, courtyard, inspection- room, a newly-built penitentiary, infirmary, chapel, work-rooms, a room for the meeting of the county ma gistrates, and apartments for the gaoler and his family : the inspecting-room is about eighteen yards in diameter, nearly circular, and having six windows, which open into each court : the total expense of erecting it was £22,461. 7. S., and the annual expenditure of the esta blishment is estimated at from £2000 to £3000. The elective franchise was conferred in the 23d of Edward I., since which time the city has regularly returned two members to parliament : the right of election is vested in the freemen generally, nearly one thousand in num ber : the mayor is the returning officer.

will first demand our attention. It is a spacious wooden structure, rude in its appearance, being built in the taste prevalent in the reign of James 1. by John Abel, the expert carpenter (as he is called in a letter from the governor, Scudamore, to Lord Digby), who in the next reign proved of so much use to the defenders of the city. It has been reduced in height, and it's beauty destroyed, in order to lessen the weight on the oaken pillars, by three rows of which (nine in each row) it is supported. In this hall were (till March, 1817), held the assizes, quarter sessions, city and county meetings, &c. It is intended to be in future appropriated to public purposes more immediately connected with the city, a new County Hall and Courts of Justice having been erected.

Under it are held the hop and corn markets. The old staircase on the south side of the building was removed in 1818, and a new one formed on it's west end, an improvement which reflects great credit on it's projectors; detracting nothing from the character of the pile, and adding greatly to cleanliness and utility. On the west side of this staircase, is the new watch and ward room, and over it an antiquated clock.

North of this building is the entrance to -

THE NEW COUNTY HALL

and Courts of Justice, erected in 1817, forms a grand and interesting object. It occupies the site of the old County Gaol, a little eastward of St. Peter's Church, and in front, a number of old

houses have been pulled down, to afford it an ample area. It has in front a portico supported by eight large fluted pillars of the Grecian Doric order, resting upon a flight of steps, and surmounted by a pediment : under it are ornaments of that order, consisting of trigliphs with metopes between, and muteles above. Three plain doorways lead into the entrance hall, beyond this is a large and high corridor, terminating with a flight of steps upon which is the entrance to the County Hall, and having on each side, passages leading to the apartments of the Judges, the jury and record rooms, &c. and to the seats of the magistrates, council, and jury in the courts. Où the right and left before we enter this passage, are two courts, or lobbies, having a flight of steps on the east sides, ascending to galleries in each of the Courts of Justice, which are fitted up with seats for the use of spectators. The Nisi Prius Court occupies the south side of the building, and the Crown Court the north. The whole is beautifully fitted up with oak; the crown court has a subterraneous passage, through which the felons are brought to the bar by a private door. They are kept, during the trials, in an apartment under the jury room. The County Hall is a most spacious and beautiful room, under it is a series of small apartments, used as a depot for the military stores of the county. It is altogether a noble work, worthy of the county which erected it, and doing great credit to the talents of the
